# Road Trip: National Museum of the US Air Force

Did you know that the oldest and largest military museum in the world is just about one hour outside of Columbus? Located at the Wright-Patterson Base near Dayton, the National Museum of the United States Air Force is a

great experience that the whole family will love. I recently took my family there on an adventure. The museum is open seven days a week, from 9am – 5pm, and admission is free!

We started our tour of the museum in the First

hanger that features aircraft from World War II and the Early Years. The family was delighted when they turned the corner and saw the zeppelin hanging from the ceiling! Many of the World War II planes featured the historic pin up imagery. After the first hanger, we entered the National Aviation Hall of Fame which included interactive for kids of all ages. Walking down the hall, displays of military and aviation uniforms showcased how far we have come with clothing technology. The next hanger featured the Southeast Asia War and Korean War. helicopters, planes and bombers filled the building. Next, we walked through an exhibit that warned us that we were crossing over into Soviet Berlin. As you enter the Cold War Gallery, the first thing you see is Defcon 1, 2, 3 on the floor and a giant picture of the atomic bomb. My 3 year old,



our youngest was very excited about the use of his favorite color, orange, meanwhile, we had to explain "the bomb" to the 6 year old. I reminded myself the inspirational quote on the wall by George Santayana towards the entry of the museum, "Those

> who cannot remember the past are condemned to repeat it."

The most exciting item in this gallery for my boys was the Space Shuttle Exhibit. You can experience the size and shape of an actual space shuttle and see how they ate and

where they sat. The last place we visited was the Missile and Space exhibit. My boys recalled a scene from the classic movie "Space Chimps" where one missile was knocked over, and the rest followed, so they were very careful in this room!

By this time, my boys were tired (and very heavy), so we exited. By the way, you have to exit through the gift shop - there are many great souvenirs and educational fun toys to buy!

We have more to visit next time, since we didn't get a chance to view the Presidential Gallery, or the various planes that were on display outside. 

someone else. Just be yourself. Learn to be confident and comfortable in your own skin. Know that you bring something to your position that no one else can because you are unique as yourself.

Leverage strengths – yours and other – focus and improve on what you're good at. Find out what you do really well and become the best at it. Good leaders can identify strengths and utilize each person's potential.

Have a council of peers – Ask someone you trust how you are doing. Know to whom you can go when you have a problem. Find someone who can tell it like it REALLY is! Someone whom you can safely receive constructive criticism.

Invite dissent – You have to create an atmosphere where people are free to speak up! You don't want "yes people" who just agree with everything. Likewise, you don't want to work with people who are just downright disagreeable. You and agree without being disagreeable! Create a safe environment in which everyone can contribute something.

**Ready, Fire, Aim – learn by doing –** Do something! After a while, you don't need to collect input, or approval, you make a decision. Plan, be ready, and then act!

The second article was titled "8 Ways to Undermine Yourself as a Leader."

Violate trust – Place yourself in a position not to violate trust. If you are trusted, people will follow you.

Be a selfish leader instead of a servant leader – Your goal is to elevate your team and celebrate each person's victories, not your own.

Lack focus and flip-flop on priorities - Your mission should be simple and straightforward for your team to follow and accomplish.

**Be user "unfriendly**" - If you're not accessible or kindhearted, or if people have to jump through hoops to reach you for a brief moment, it's inevitable that you'll leave a bad taste with someone.

Deal in fantasy instead of science - Vision is crucial. You need to have an end goal and believe in it strongly. However, that vision requires execution to make it a reality. You need to track progress obsessively with metrics so you're able to make real-time adjustments and tweaks. Without this, you're just a used-car salesman spinning the wheels of everyone you meet.

Lack passion and creativity – If you are going to ask someone else to do something, you have to do it too! If you want your team members to think outside the box, why are you coloring inside the lines? Let people know you believe in what you are doing.

Play checkers instead of chess – As a leader, think a few moves down the board.

Act as if it's just about what you say – It's all about the way you make other people feel. You want to bring out the best in others. Make them want to come to work and feel valued in your presence.
